### **Commending**

The Friends of the Marin County Free Library
On their 50<sup>th</sup> Anniversary

**WHEREAS,** on September 23, 1969, the founding volunteer members of the Friends of the Marin County Free Library dedicated their efforts "to focus public attention on library services, facilities, and needs; to stimulate gifts of books; and to encourage donations in the form of endowments and bequests; and

**WHEREAS**, the Friends of Marin County Free Library is celebrating 50 years of financial support for the county's libraries, focusing on literacy and programming for Marin's residents; and

**WHEREAS,** since its inception, the Friends have given over \$2 million in direct support to the ten branches of the Marin County Free Library; and

**WHEREAS,** the Friends of the Marin County Free Library has 500 members countywide, including residents who devote their time, talents and energy serving in five local chapters: Friends of the Civic Center Library, Friends of the Corte Madera Library, Friends of the Fairfax Library, Friends of the Marin City Library, and Friends of the Novato Libraries; and

**WHEREAS,** 5,063 Marin County children and 448 teens participated in the library's 2019 Summer Challenge, a program supported by the Friends. In the Summer Challenge, students read during the summer, avoid the "summer slide," and return to school ready to learn; and

**WHEREAS,** the Friends support all programs for children and adults at the library enabling community members to enjoy them free of charge. Programs include book clubs, art docent talks, lectures and presentations, family activities and crafts, language clubs, and "STEAM" activities for children; and

WHEREAS, over 100 friendly volunteers work at the Friends used bookstore, the Book Place on Grant Avenue in Novato. The Book Place is a resource for budget-minded book lovers, students and teachers. The Book Place also donates books to shelters, jails, and schools in need; and

**WHEREAS,** the Friends have provided the libraries with shelving, tables, chairs, carpeting, and landscaping, making our libraries comfortable and attractive community gathering spaces.

**NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED** that the Board of Supervisors of the County of Marin hereby commends and thanks the Friends of the Marin County Free Library for 50 years of service to people of all ages and backgrounds, promoting literacy and the lifelong love of learning in Marin County.

### President's Corner

What a wonderful success we had with the 2019 Summer Reading Challenge at our branches! Children who participate in the Library's summer reading program not only return to school better prepared, they are developing a lifelong habit of reading and learning. This summer, a total of 5639 children participated, 1137 for the first time.

This summer's program proved fun and educational not only for children but for their families as well. Each branch was able to offer kids and their parents a field trip in partnership with National, State or local parks. Every branch held engaging and interactive programs. Almost 100 kids and their parents in Inverness and Stinson Beach learned about raptors firsthand. In Fairfax, 32 attendees learned what it takes to become a ballerina. Kids earned book bucks for reading, and they could "buy" prizes that this year were designed to encourage outdoor exploration and play: magnifying bug viewers, nature journals, backpacks, binoculars and compasses, as well as books. Children generously donated 1589 of their book bucks to parks, and this will be matched by the County Friends and the Marin Library Foundation, providing a substantial contribution to one of our valuable partners in this year's Summer Challenge.

Library Leaves is published quarterly; the next issue will be in January. The deadline for submission of copy is January 3. News of library activities, updates, photos, ideas, and suggestions for improvement are welcome.

This month we are celebrating fifty years of the Friends of the Marin County Free Library, including a proclamation of Commendation by the Marin County Board of Supervisors to be issued on September 24. The Friends of Marin County Free Library was established in 1969 to: encourage literacy; expand educational opportunities for the community; focus public attention on library services, facilities and needs; and provide financial support for the county's library branches.

Fifty years later, we are still helping to keep libraries vital, fun, and educational. Since inception, the Friends have given over \$2 million of direct support for ten county branches. We have over 500 members county-wide, including members of five local chapters. Annually, the funding provided to the branches averages \$55,000, mainly targeted at programming for children and teens, with the Summer Learning Program being a traditional mainstay in the funding mix. The Friends also fund a growing Spanish language collection, provide programming and materials linked to STEAM (Science, Tech, Engineering, Arts, and Math) as well as traditional and popular offerings, and assist with campaign measures aimed at keeping libraries current and responsive to the community's expectations.

The Friends achieve our funding goals largely through memberships, monetary donations, and through purchases at our used book store, The Book Place in Novato. Everything at The Book Place is donated by the public, making it another way to support our libraries. Be sure to stop by during our Half-Price Clearance Sale October 4–6 and also join us for Friends-sponsored events at your local branches to help us celebrate our 50th Anniversary!

Summer has wound down, but there are always new events to look forward to. For one, you are invited to our appreciation event for Friends of Novato Library on Sunday, September 22, 5:00 p.m. at the Novato library, 1720 Novato Blvd. This is a members-only event, but you may join or renew your membership at the door (\$15 single, \$25 family). Guest speaker will be Julia Flynn Siler, New York Times best-selling author and journalist. She will discuss her book, The White Devil's Daughters: The Women Who Fought Against Slavery in San Francisco's Chinatown. Looking back to the past few months, here are some highlights from our wonderfully successful Summer Learning Challenge. Whole Foods was an amazing resource for the library, providing prizes and inspiration!

### • Summer Challenge Prizes

The Novato Library stocked 239 donated Whole Food prizes. Children earned Book Bucks for reaching reading goals and those Book Bucks could be turned in for prizes based on 500 minutes of reading and 1,000 minutes of reading. Children could donate their Book Bucks if they preferred, and the real money (provided by the Friends and the Marin Library Foundation) went to the parks this year. Book Bucks accounted for 166,500 minutes—2,775 hours of reading!

#### • Monthly Raffles

The Novato Library held raffles in June, July and August. Raffle tickets were awarded for each 100 minutes of reading. 951 tickets were entered accounting for 95,100 minutes—1,585 hours of reading!

#### • Community Vehicle Day

The library ended the summer with a Community Vehicle Day! We had 165 people and 14 vehicles including fire trucks, a police motorcycle, a mail delivery truck and so much more. At the end everyone came up onto the library lawn for a raffle. We raffled off eight sorter trucks donated by Whole Foods.

#### • Super Reader Party

Forty prizes were awarded for the Library's Big Super Reader party. Each child that came to the party had read for 2,500 or more minutes. That equates to over 100,000 minutes—over 1,660 hours of reading!



#### More Stats

- 287 youngsters signed up for the Challenge at Novato Library.
- 65 youngsters participated for the first time, earning at least one Book Buck.
- 59 earned "Gold Medal Reader" status having read for at least 800 hours.
- 1,667 Book Bucks were given out.
- 41 child/family programs including 14 field trips/camp visits were offered during the summer, engaging 1,081 participants.
- 8 programs (including two class visits) reached 140 teens.

### **Civic Center News**

The Friends of the Civic Center Library was organized in 2000 in response to a rumor that the County intended to close the library and take over the space. The County contended that the lack of public support for the library was proved by the fact that unlike other branches of the Marin County Free Library, it had no "Friends" chapter. Therefore, some local people decided to form a chapter.

The original purpose of our chapter was to support the Civic Center Library, and it still is, but more financially now than politically. This is done through the presentation of a "Wish List" by the head librarian to the Friends board, reflecting the needs of various areas of the library: California Room, Children's Room, Teen Area, Adult Reading. We have funded shelving, furniture, machines, reading materials and activities such as "Trivia Cafe." We support the Summer Learning Challenge for children. The board raises money for these projects through income from dues, donations, and work at The Book Place. The main function of the board is to keep track of our funds and to approve as many "Wish List" items as possible each year.

The Civic Center Friends has remained active since its beginning in 2000, although like other Friends chapters, it has struggled for members over the years. The current president is Penny Wells, and she would love to hear from any local folks who might like to join the Civic Center Friends and support the Civic Center Library. 

Alexandra Brown, Author of *Hidden History of Napa Valley* will appear at an author event sponsored by the Friends of the Marin City Library on Saturday, October 12 at 1 pm.

Attendees are invited to join local author Alexandra Brown as she explores lesser known stories of ordinary people who helped shape modern-day wine country. "Wine country was built on more than just vineyards, but just beneath the surface is a more complex version of history. Uncover the story of Napa's first Chinatown—once home to nearly five hundred immigrants—that dwindled to fewer than seventeen residents before the last buildings were razed in the early twentieth century. Meet the small but determined group of African-American farmers and barbers who called Napa home and the indomitable May Howard, a successful business woman and brothel owner. Learn about the Bracero program that kept many of Napa's wineries including Krug, Beaulieu and Stag's Leap thriving during World War II.






