The Novato Library, after two extended delays, has finally reopened to the public! Novato is the busiest library in the system and we know this extended closure greatly impacted the public. The library reopened Saturday, March 16 and patrons are back and are expressing their excitement and gratitude about them being open for business. A huge thanks to Daniel Avalos, Janet Doerge and Amy Sonnie who led the awesome teams from Novato and South Novato through many challenges, changing timelines and buckets of water. The South Novato Library was actually "discovered" by some people who didn't even know a library was there. Some other displaced patrons spilled over into the extended service of the Pop-Up location at the Northgate Mall, and our ebranch services were more popular than ever during the closure. We also extended our fine-free period to accommodate the inconvenience. We are all glad to have the closure behind us, although we now are more aware than ever that the roof needs real attention before our next storm season.

## President's Corner

Virginia Schultz, President Friends of the Marin County Free Library It's Our 50th Anniversary!

What a year 1969 was! It was the year of the moon landing, the inaugural flight of the 747, the first ATM, and the debut of Sesame Street. Closer to home, we had the People's Park in Berkeley, the takeover of Alcatraz by native Americans, and the first Gap store on Ocean Avenue in San Francisco. These events are chronicled in 1969: The Year Everything Changed by Rob Kirkpatrick.

It certainly *was* a year of change. Contrast the photos of Millie Bissinger, the driving force who launched the Friends in 1969, and a photo of the Rolling Stones that same year.





Here in Marin County, a group of 16 library supporters met on September 23, 1969, to establish the Friends of the Marin County Free Library. The group's purpose was "to maintain an association of persons interested in books and libraries; to focus public attention on library services, facilities, and needs; and to stimulate gifts of books, magazines, desirable collections, endowments, and bequests."

Programs for children and youth have been a continuing focus for the Friends. Records show that we spent \$925 for children's summer programs in 1973; this fiscal year we have budgeted \$34,000 for Summer Reading and \$8,000 for other, year-round youth programs. We've also given the libraries books and equipment/furnishings. Back in 1983-84, the Friends contributed \$8,000 toward a computer! In contrast, this year the Novato Friends are giving staff two iPads for less than \$700.



## **Civic Center News**

On February 1st Master Gardener Joe Jennings spoke at the Civic Center Library on how to get our garden soil ready for spring planting. Entertaining and informative, Joe is the guy that told us how to get bumper crops of tomatoes last year. I did what he said and, by the end of the season, was giving tomatoes away. This time he detailed why healthy soil is important and what to do to get it. It's more complex than you'd think. So, if it ever stops raining we now know what to do.

Then on February 25th Brian Crawford, local Marinite and historian, gave an illustrated talk at the Anne Kent California Room Annex (1600 Los Gamos in San Rafael) about his new book, "Shipwrecks of Marin." Oh my. There have been over 100 disastrous shipwrecks on the Marin coast! He recounted tales (with pictures to prove it) of tragedy and heroes and high adventure during bad weather and foggy conditions starting in the good old days of the Spanish galleons and proceeding to the present. Marin has beaches and landmarks named after some of the ships. The remains of the Tennessee (at Tennessee Beach) are sometimes exposed when winter storms wash away the sand. Duxbury Reef is named for the Duxbury after it wrecked there. The list goes on. If you missed the talk and are intrigued by exciting and hair-raising, true life, drama right here in Marin—read the book -"Shipwrecks of Marin" by Brian Crawford.

The *All Things Apple* series, classes for beginner and intermediate Apple users was well attended. A new session will begin in mid-May.

Our current art exhibit in the Community Room features "Birds Together," an intergenerational display of work featuring Redwood High School student Caleb Jordan-McDaniels (photography) and his grandmother, local artist Helen Drake Muirhead. ## **Marin City News**

It was a celebratory day at the Marin City Library when we learned that branch manager Diana Lopez had been awarded one of the highest honors for American librarians by the Library Journal, a prestigious national trade publication. Diana was told in early March she was among nine "2019 Advocates" for her leadership in unfolding the potential of "an untapped community resource." The March 19 edition of Marin Independent Journal's front page, above-the-fold article announced Diana's award "A force of nature—Librarian gets national honor for leadership at branch." The Marin County Post, a weekly Marin City newspaper headlined "National Honor for Marin City Library Manager, Diana Lopez earns accolade as advocate and literacy partner."



Diana joined MCFL in 2013, and prior to being appointed branch manager and Education Initiative Coordinator in October 2017 she was instrumental in extending the branch's hours to seven days a week, partnered with the Sausalito-Marin City School District to oversee the library at Bayside Martin Luther King Academy, and expanded its book inventory and helped to secure funding for new technologies. This is the first time an MCFL employee has received such recognition from the Library Journal. Only about 100 librarians have received Advocate status since its inception in 2002. Congratulations to Diana and the great staff at Marin City.

## **Notes from Novato**

Patrons and staff were thrilled to return to the Novato Library when it reopened on March 16th. While the South Novato branch was a savior to many, it was wonderful to return "home." As staff commented, "We expected to close for the scheduled replacement of our HVAC system. We did NOT expect to end up swimming in the 'atmospheric river' storm systems that followed! Leaks have been fixed, drains cleaned or replaced, ceiling and walls repaired and repainted, and we are once again open for business! You, our loyal patrons, have stood forlornly at the door, shouted your greetings through the book drops, and waited more or less patiently for this moment...while we work in the cold and the damp and the solitude awaiting your return. We are delighted to see you!"

Marin County Free Library's summer reading program, Summer Challenge, kicks in as soon as the regular school year ends. The Summer Challenge is designed to combat summer slide (children can "slide" backwards several months in their reading, writing and math skills if they don't engage with these skills during the summer). The Summer Challenge officially runs at Novato from June 15-August 10, 2019, and is for kids ages 0-12 years. You do not have to be reading on your own to participate! Kids who have just graduated from 5th grade have the choice of participating in the Kids' or Teens' Summer Challenge. In the Kids' Summer Challenge, for every 100




