Message From the Director's Office

The Marin County Free Library is kicking off the new fiscal year by eliminating all overdue fines! Starting on July 1, our library system joins neighboring jurisdictions like Contra Costa, Berkeley, Oakland, San Mateo County, Alameda County, and Sonoma County in going fine-free to ensure that all members of our community have equitable access to library books and materials.

Studies have shown that late fines can be a significant barrier to library access and drive borrowers away, particularly those living on low or fixed incomes. Countywide, the percentage of current library patrons who are blocked from checking out library materials because of fines is 7.9% while in our less affluent communities, the percentage is 10.5%. Library overdue fines represent just a tiny portion of the library's budget. During the past fiscal year, overdue fines accounted for less than one half of one percent of our total revenues, yet collecting overdue fines requires an inordinate amount of staff time and energy. We believe that staff time is valuable and should be spent supporting our patrons and our communities!

If you enjoyed paying overdue fines as a way of supporting our libraries, we thank you and invite you to continue providing direct support to our Marin

Did you know that children who don't read during the summer can lose up to two months of learning by the time they return to school in the fall? Children who participate in library summer reading programs and read at least six books over the summer are better prepared for the next school year, often scoring higher in reading and math. As of this writing, 523 enthusiastic readers have signed up at the Corte Madera branch. In partnership with our Parks sponsors there are currently over 3800 children participating in the Summer Challenge. One Book Buck is earned for every 100 minutes of reading. Book Bucks can be spent at the Summer Reading Store, entered into a raffle or donated to our Giving Program benefitting the National Parks Service. Led by Branch Librarian Diana Lopez, Marin City Library staff are busy this summer with weekly STEAM activities for 20 K-2nd graders on Wednesdays as part of the Marin City SumMERSION 2019 and a part of the summer reading program. SumMERSION is a wraparound summer program with Marin City community partners including Marin Housing Authority, the Hannah Project's Freedom School, Bridge the Gap College Prep, Play Marin, Boys & Girls Club, and the Marin City Community Services District.

Notes from Novato

The Novato library has a full schedule of events this summer for all ages: toddlers, children, teens, and adults. In addition to the main Novato branch some happen at the South Novato branch, so take note of location. Here are a few to consider.

The summer reading challenge is always a big hit. So far 2,695 kids and 61 teens have signed up. They earn Book Bucks that can be turned in for prizes by reading or participating in special activities. One such event held every Wednesday is Plaza Nights Under the Summer Stars from 5:30 to 6:30. Come have fun making crafts or playing games. Library staff and volunteers are on hand to help. Recent craft projects were building a mini aquarium and making a model of Sporky from the latest Toy Story film. Stop by at any time and tell the librarian a joke to earn additional Book Bucks.

From now through August 13 drop by the South Novato branch on Tuesdays from 6 to 7:30 p.m. to try out new virtual reality sets. Youth interns will demonstrate the technology and help beginners. Learn how to use a headset to enter a three-dimensional world. You can visit the Grand Canyon, Yosemite, Joshua Tree National Park and other special places.

One particularly interesting program is the Conversation Club in Spanish which meets weekly year-round on Tuesdays at 11am. The group, typically 8–15 participants, comprises primarily native English speakers who gather each week to improve their Spanish speaking skills. Most individuals have already attained advanced beginner to intermediate proficiency in the language.


Plaza Nights Under the Summer Stars at the Novato Library.

Participants join in for a range of reasons. Some plan to travel to a Spanish speaking country. Some have married into a Spanish-speaking family. Others just enjoy the challenge of learning a new language or for the companionship of like minded people. Several have participated for a number of years while others are relatively new to the group. It was explained to me that while there are a number of resources for learning via listening, for example computer programs and college courses, the emphasis of this club is speaking Spanish and interacting with others doing the same.

The club is facilitated by Maria Lee Goodrich. Typically she poses a question to which each member answers to the best of their Spanish-speaking ability. After everyone has had a chance to respond, they break into smaller groups to talk about whatever topics they choose. Occasionally there is also a presentation.

There is also a Monday English Conversation Club for everyone where participants work to improve English language skills. Participation varies. There have been years where half of the club was Spanish speaking and the other half Chinese speaking. Right now there are two to three Persian speakers and one to two Spanish speakers. There are usually six to eight participants, including the tutors.

The clubs are always open to newcomers.



Note that this treasurer's report does not include financial data from our five chapters (Friends of Civic Center Library, Friends of Corte Madera Library, Friends of Fairfax Library, Friends of Marin City Library, and Friends of Novato Libraries). Their data will be incorporated later in the year for our filings as a 501(c)3 nonprofit with the IRS and FTB.

Membership dues totaled \$11,236 this year. Contributions include gifts from individuals and corporate match programs (including AmazonSmile). We received several gifts from people donating a portion of their retirement savings required minimum disbursement (RMD).

Book Place rent went up with a new lease agreement. The process of handling requests from librarians for funding for programming is being streamlined. Over all it was a good year, and I expect 2019/2020 to be a good year as well!
