Happy New Year!

2020 and 2021 were incredibly challenging years for libraries around the world, but they were also years that offered libraries the opportunity to reimagine existing services. Marin County Free Library rose to the challenge of the COVID-19 pandemic and quickly pivoted to not only restructure services provided from our physical buildings but also created new services in support of some of our most vulnerable communities in Marin. Here are just a few of the changes we made during the last two years:

- Established curbside pickup service so that patrons could continue to enjoy checking out library materials during some of the most restrictive shelter-inplace periods.
- Moved programming for all ages to a virtual environment. Some of our highest attended programs were for adults, who could engage with one another while accessing educational and cultural content from the safety of their own homes.
- Offered outdoor storytimes for young children. Nothing could be better than sitting under one of the massive trees at our Fairfax Library and having storytime with Miss Iris!
- Created learning hubs for children to support the new world of distance learning.
- Supported childcare centers for emergency workers in library branches.
- Continued our Bookmobile and Learning Bus services to reach those who could not reach us.
- Transitioned our reference and information services to a virtual environment.

Many of these initiatives were supported by Friends of the Library funds and I thank all of you for your partnership during these turbulent and unexpected times. MCFL's customer service, even in this unprecedented time, is excellent and we are thankful to be able to provide community members with not only our core, traditional services but a few more.

As we head into 2022, many more opportunities lay before us. We are in the final weeks of completing a county-wide survey that will provide us with key information on what the community loves about their local libraries and what they need for the future. Our Community Survey (https://marinlibrary.org/survey) will close on January 18. I encourage you to complete it and ask that you share the news about the survey with family and friends. Your feedback is essential!

We will also be holding "community chats" in all regions of the county through June 2022 to connect one-one-one with community members about library services. If the Friends of the Library would like to co-sponsor any of these events, please contact your local library.

We are, and will be, actively working with our community advocates and supporters to ensure the successful renewal of the library's Measure A parcel tax, due to go before the voters in November 2022. Support for the Marin County Free Library is strong, but the renewal of Measure A is instrumental in providing community members with excellent resources, staff, and facilities.

It has been a pleasure to connect with individual Friends of the Library groups during my first few months with Marin County Free Library and I look forward to meeting more of you! Marin City Library staff, Diana Lopez, Isaiah Hurtado and Etienne Douglas, are busy with re-stocking the two libraries of the still un-named schools that comprise the Sausalito Marin City School District and providing programs and activities for children and parents. The Marin City Branch Library is open for an extended seven days a week, but is limited to services such as computer appointments, in-library browsing and the book drop open at all hours. Friends of the Marin City Library had their November and December meetings in person, a welcome respite from months of Zoom meetings. The new Library Director, Lana Adlawan, and Deputy Director of County Services, Raemona Little-Taylor, attended our December meeting. Aside from providing us with their respective professional backgrounds they addressed a number of topics particularly relevant to the Marin City branch, including the partnerships with the SMCSD, Nicasio and the Novato school Districts with a policy of "support and not replace school libraries." In 2022 the MCFL will be focusing on adult programs, physical space, partnerships, senior adult programming as well as the November 2022 parcel tax renewal ballot measure.

The Marin City Friends also provided support for Marin City Community Services District Holiday Crafts Event, a Health Fair on the Phillips Drive campus and gift cards and refreshments for a Family Exploratory/STEAM night at the library, holiday tips for service providers, a holiday staff dinner and the purchase of six climate fiction books for a 7th/8th grade project from Sausalito Books By the Bay who provides a discount.




Meet Natalie McCall, our new Branch Manager at South Novato Library


Your input is requested!



The updated children's room at Corte Madera Library.



The holiday season has come and gone, and was fairly successful for us. January and February tend to be quiet months, so this would be a good time to visit us and stock up for the winter nights ahead.

Our current focus is on book donations. We've recently seen fewer books (not so with movies/CDs). Our bookstore is dependent on your donations—we greatly appreciate them. We'd love to have your gently-used books. Our donation days are Tuesday, Thursday, and Saturday, from 10-3. Please bring donations on those days ONLY, when we are staffed to receive and screen them. Please do NOT leave bags or boxes by the doors when we are closed.

We encourage you to check the Donation Guidelines on our website. We try to keep our store organized and fresh, with a collection of recent books in good condition. Ask yourself, "Would I buy this book?" If your books do not fit the bill, please recycle them at home, or donate to others such as Goodwill. And thank you for your understanding. A few pointers:

 We really need adult material (History, Military, Nonfiction, Biographies, in particular). So if you

- are planning to clear your shelves, this might be the time for it.
- We sell a lot of children's books, so they are always welcomed.
- We're always overloaded with hardcover Mystery, and frequently need to decline them for a month to keep inventory in check. We discourage donations of one author, all at once; we don't have the space.
- A general reminder that books without jackets (unless older, pre-jacket editions) are undesirable. They have no "shelf appeal," so they never sell.
- Please pay particular attention to categories with age limits, e.g., Science, Psychology, Health, and Business are limited to those books published in the last five years anything older does not sell, unless it is a true classic (Stephen Hawking, Sagan, or Asimov).

Book Review

The Arbornaut: A Life Discovering the Eighth Continent in the Trees Above Us by Meg Lowman, PhD


This rather lengthy book is an autobiography/memoir by Meg Lowman, a woman now in her late 60s. She details her early life and how she went to Australia to get her PhD and while there fell in love, got married, and had two kids. She then left her husband and took the kids back to the USA. That is about the last of her personal life that she shares with the reader, except for the fact, which she brings up repeatedly, about how hard it was to be a woman involved in scientific research, especially in "field" research such as hers. The rest of the book is documentation of her work as a botanical researcher specializing in the canopy of trees. It is considerable and the reader will be amazed at the wealth of knowledge she uncovered and how she went about it. There is a lot more to trees than you ever knew! The book is available at the library.

The Evening and the Morning by Ken Follett

This recent book is the preguel to *The Pillars of the Earth*, written by Mr. Follett in 1989. Like the previous book this is quite a commitment to read—911 pages—but it is a fascinating look at life in the year 997 and onward. Despite its length, it is a pretty easy read. This is not fine literature, but a rip-roaring story of love, community, and the conflict between the church and everyday life. The characters are interesting, daily life is described in detail, and the story of how a self-taught craftsman becomes a master mason building an enormous cathedral is good reading. This book will keep you busy for several rainy winter evenings.
